Georgia CTAE: Current Status

CTAE is the workforce development engine for K-12 in Georgia

> 17 career cluster areas and 145+ pathways

CTAE programs are in every school system in Georgia

≻703,476 students participated in CTAE statewide

≻70% of all high students and 66% of all middle school students participated in CTAE

>97.75% of CTAE completers graduated from high school, which is 13 percentage points higher than the state average graduation rate.

15 school districts received a grant of up to \$15,000


Goal: Develop Community Alignment Action Plan to support alignment of CTAE Pathways with local and regional labor force needs






Economic Development Partnership (EDP)

A district wide certification process that prepares school districts to adopt best practices and behaviors that support economic development, strengthen their programs, and align education with key regional industries.

Without building CONNECTIONS between employers, educators & students, Troup County is vulnerable regarding the creation of a future workforce & attracting new residents.

Avalanche Consulting, 2017

- Students must opt into program.
- Unable to enroll if credit deficient due to scheduling.
- Summer camps/STEM Camps required letter of recommendation from a teacher or pastor.
- Recruitment didn't align with industry needs.
- Demographics mirrored the school system, but not academic demographics.
- Industry's voice not being heard and disengaged "If it's not broken, why fix it?".

PROGRAM STRUCTURE COULD IMPACT AT-RISK, LOWER SOCIO-ECONOMIC, EDUCATIONALLY DISENFRANCHISED STUDENTS AND STUDENTS THAT WOULD REMAIN IN COMMUNITY POST HIGH-SCHOOL GRADUATION.



82% stated their organization is not partnering/communicating with local school system to help design curriculum, communicate needs, develop training programs, and/or sponsor apprenticeships to help students acquire skills necessary for success. 80% reported they had immedi 73% 73% reported they willing to hir 43% 43% reported they anticipate a Out of 264 students in WBL, on

80% reported they had immediate need for entry-level labor that they will train themselves.

73% reported they willing to hire high-school graduates with no experience.

43% reported they anticipate an expansion or retooling in the next 24 months.

Out of 264 students in WBL, only 4 were in the manufacturing sector.

WHAT WE'VE LEARNED

• The MISSING Middle.

- Industry to provide youth employment and internship opportunities.
- Alignment is process engineering.
- Strategic recruitment based on skills/talents and aptitudes- impacts outcomes for ALL pathways.
- Mechanisms to measure data relevant to industry partners.
- Alignment should support educators and counselors, not add to their already heavy workload.
- Use the resources available; Relationships with GADOE, Carl Vinson Institute and Georgia Tech.
- Learn from those doing it well!
- The Sunk Cost Fallacy Build trust with all stakeholders.
- Alignment is never finished; Look for blind spots.

ALIGNMENT BENEFITS ALL STAKEHOLDERS.

THE MOST SIGNIFICANT BARRIER TO ALIGNMENT IS COMMUNICATION.

ARE WE SPEAKING THE SAME LANGUAGE?

Alignment Simplified:

- Robust Business Retention & Expansion program and authentic relationships.
- Simplify the process, the data and the communication.
- Measurable, with data presented in a transparent way.
- **Project based learning and STEM/STEAM Exposure.**
- Educators identify skills/aptitudes/talents of individual students, counselors support with counseling of individual aptitudes, connect student talent to relevant educational pathways and industry Work Based Learning and Youth Apprenticeship opportunities.
- Business partners create opportunities for students in Work Based Learning, Youth Apprenticeships and Job Shadowing and participate in school level activities and engagement events.
