
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




Georgia Vocational Rehabilitation Agency Disability Statistics – Georgia's Population


Georgians with Disabilities 1,428,789








Georgia Vocational Rehabilitation Agency Disability Statistics - Age



Georgia Vocational Rehabilitation Agency Disability Statistics - Type





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
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
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














Commuting to Work - 2019

Eligibility for VR services:

- You have a physical or mental impairment
- Goal of Employment
- Service will help maintain, sustain, or obtain competitive integrated employment

VR Services may include, but are not limited to:

- Post-Secondary Education and Training
- Career Counseling and Guidance
- Job Coaching and Placement
- On-the-Job Training
- Job Site Assessment and Accommodations
- Modifications to homes, vehicles, and worksites
- Assistive Technology Assessments and Devices
- Medical and Psychological Assessments
- Time-Limited Medical and/or Psychological Treatment



Georgia Vocational Rehabilitation Agency Pre-Employment Transition Services (Pre-ETS)

PRE-ETS Services:


- Represent the earliest set of services available for students with disabilities who
 are eligible or potentially eligible for VR services,
- Are short-term in nature, and
- Are designed to help students identify career interests, which may be further explored through additional vocational rehabilitation (VR) services, such as transition services and other individualized VR services.

Eligibility for Pre-Employment Transition

- Students receiving special education services who have an IEP, 504 plan, or a documented disability,
- Age 14 to age 21, and
- Enrolled in a recognized educational program.




Georgia Vocational Rehabilitation Agency Client Composition






Georgia Vocational Rehabilitation Agency Student Composition

Partnered with the Atlanta Braves

- First-ever Agency hosted transition enterprise event
- Provided career exploration, training, and other opportunities to 1,300 high school students with disabilities from across the state at Truist Park on June 30, 2024.

Partnered with the Georgia National Fair in Perry, GA last October for outreach event, "Welcoming Our Workforce" or "WOW" Wednesday, in recognition of Disability Employment Awareness Month and in support of GVRA's statewide awareness campaign. Between 18,000 to 20,000 people attended the fair on that day.

Georgia Vocational Rehabilitation Agency Transition Services

Bud McCall Post-Secondary Vocational Rehabilitation Grant

- Effective January 2024, GVRA began offering the Bud McCall grant to students, with disabilities seeking post-secondary opportunities and other VR services.
- Undergraduate students who meet the requirements are eligible for the grant for up to five years.
- The annual grant totals up to \$17,725 per year to cover tuition, books, and maintenance costs based on eligibility.

Requirements

- Must apply for services and be determined eligible as a GVRA client
- Must provide an acceptance letter for an accredited degree program at a college or university OR a degree, diploma, or Technical Certificate of Credit (TCC) program at a technical college
- Complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) every year
- Must apply all comparable benefits for which the individual is eligible, including Pell grants, before applying the Bud McCall Grant to their balance
- Must submit updates to include grades, student account details, and class semester to their counselor to maintain eligibility

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






ALBANY AREA CHAMBER FOUNDATION



As attendees arrive, they are assigned a table and a table number. This was how they were called to their interviews. Interviews occur in 4 minute intervals and focus on workforce related content.




During 1:1 Interviews, the students at the tables work through networking card prompts with their table facilitators to focus on things like introductions, talking about their dreams/goals, etc.













Participants were given an agenda, a certificate of completion & a survey.

Survey Results showed that more than 70% of students in attendance left THRIVE with a new plan for post-graduation.
